SVPL 2023 in Review

Salmo Valley Public Library Annual Report 2023

As we look back and reflect on 2023, we can see our commitment to serving the community and promoting literacy was as strong as ever. Throughout the year, we not only strived to enrich the lives of all in Salmo, Ymir and Area G through various activities, events, and initiatives, but we also worked to enhance and improve the building that houses the library, support our staff and volunteers and, and strengthen the library governance.

We began the year by focusing on family literacy and hosting engaging activities such as the spelling bee, trivia events, Metis Storytime and a drum circle session with COINS. This was complemented by our Monthly Mobile Children's Librarian service to Ymir, which started back up again in partnership with Columbia Basin Alliance for Literacy (CBAL) and extends support to family groups within our area.

As the year progressed, we continued to provide opportunities such as author readings, professional development activities, and take-away crafts for patrons, enriching their experiences at the library. Collaborations with the Kootenay Library Foundation (KLF) brought enriching online presentations to our community, while our work with CBAL brought many excellent programs, such as Tech Learning Centre and Mother Goose Storytimes. We have the Books for Babies initiative to extend our early years literacy work further, which supports early literacy efforts. These books, bags and CDs are given to the local health nurse who gets them out to families with newborns in the community.

March Spring Break brought tailored activities for young minds, followed by readings and community-building fundraisers (thanks to our Friends of the Salmo Library). Additionally, we extended tax support to 52 seniors and low-income community members, alleviating financial burdens during a challenging time.

We celebrated literature and history throughout Poetry Month, Live History events, and Reading Garden gatherings, fostering a deeper connection with our cultural heritage. Our Scrabble tournament and local history presentations further engaged our patrons and strengthened community ties.

Empowering workshops on Advanced Care planning and engaging Metis Storytime sessions enriched our programming in June. We thanked our dedicated volunteers at a celebration in the Phyllis Tatum Reading Garden. We also had the timely installation of two heat pumps, which marked a significant step toward ensuring the comfort and well-being of our patrons and

allowing the library to serve as a cooling centre during heat waves. This project was made possible by grant funding from the Province of BC Emergency Planning & Preparedness Grant, supplemented by funds from a Columbia Basin Trust Climate Resiliency grant.

The summer months included literacy promotion activities, including the Summer Reading Club and a Tween Bookclub. We enhanced community convenience by adding CO2 Monitors to our Library of Things collection and upgrading to energy-efficient LED lights, demonstrating our commitment to sustainability.

With the resumption of regular programs such as Lego Club, Storytimes, and Bookclubs in September, we continued to foster a love for learning among our patrons. Collaborations with the local seniors' groups further enriched our offerings, while craft bag takeaways and mobile library visits to the Salmo Estates extended our reach within the community.

October brought celebrations for Library Month, highlighting the importance of libraries in our society. Throughout November, we prioritized community outreach and partnerships, including collaborations with the food bank and early years programming. In December, we collected new book donations for the local food bank's Christmas hampers and spread holiday cheer through family Storytime events, emphasizing the spirit of giving and community connections.

These are just some of the fantastic events, programs, and learning opportunities at SVPL this year, and we didn't even mention the books! One thing is certain: we can see a steady increase in library access. From our door counter, we know from 2022 (14,398) to 2023 (15,297), we welcomed 899 more people through our doors from one year to the next.

Although we have our struggles (funding, underpaid staff, inflation, challenges to intellectual freedoms - to name a few), the prudent utilization of the library funding has enabled us to enhance our services and facilities throughout the year. From upgrades to energy-efficient LED lighting to acquisitions improving accessibility and patron experience, our commitment to serving the community remains unwavering.

Reflecting on 2023's accomplishments, we sincerely thank our patrons, volunteers, donors, and partners for their continued support. Together, we look forward to another year of serving as a place of knowledge, creativity, and community spirit in the Salmo Valley.
